A BILL

To protect children against sexual abuse and exploitation, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Preventing Child Sex
- 5 Abuse Act of 2023".

6 SEC. 2. SENSE OF CONGRESS.

7 The sense of Congress is the following:

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(1) The safety of children should be a top pri-

2	ority for public officials and communities in the
3	United States.
4	(2) According to the Rape, Abuse & Incest Na-
5	tional Network, an individual in the United States is
6	sexually assaulted every 68 seconds. And every 9
7	minutes, that victim is a child. Meanwhile, only 25
8	out of every 1,000 perpetrators will end up in pris-
9	on.
10	(3) The effects of child sexual abuse can be
11	long-lasting and affect the victim's mental health.
12	(4) Victims are more likely than non-victims to
13	experience the following mental health challenges:
14	(A) Victims are about 4 times more likely
15	to develop symptoms of drug abuse.
16	(B) Victims are about 4 times more likely
17	to experience post-traumatic stress disorder as
18	adults.
19	(C) Victims are about 3 times more likely
20	to experience a major depressive episode as
21	adults.
22	(5) The criminal justice system should and has
23	acted as an important line of defense to protect chil-
24	dren and hold perpetrators accountable.

(6) However, the horrific crimes perpetuated by
 Larry Nassar demonstrate firsthand the loopholes
 that still exist in the criminal justice system. While
 Larry Nassar was found guilty of several State-level
 offenses, he was not charged federally for his illicit
 sexual contact with minors, despite crossing State
 and international borders to commit this conduct.

8 (7) The Department of Justice has also identi-9 fied a growing trend of Americans who use chari-10 table or missionary work in a foreign country as a 11 cover for sexual abuse of children.

(8) It is the intent of Congress to prohibit
Americans from engaging in sexual abuse or exploitation of minors under the guise of work, including
volunteer work, with an organization that affects
interstate or foreign commerce, such as an international charity.

(9) Federal law does not require that an abuser's intention to engage in sexual abuse be a primary, significant, dominant, or motivating purpose
of the travel.

(10) Child sexual abuse does not require physical contact between the abuser and the child. This
is especially true as perpetrators turn increasingly to

- internet platforms, online chat rooms, and webcams
 to commit child sexual abuse.
- 3 (11) However, a decision of the United States
 4 Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit found the
 5 use of a webcam to engage in sexually provocative
 6 activity with a minor did not qualify as "sexual ac7 tivity".

8 (12) Congress can address this issue by amend-9 ing the definition of the term "sexual activity" to 10 clarify that it does not require interpersonal, phys-11 ical contact.

(13) It is the duty of Congress to provide clearer guidance to ensure that those who commit crimes
against children are prosecuted to the fullest extent
of the law.

16 SEC. 3. INTERSTATE CHILD SEXUAL ABUSE.

17 Section 2423 of title 18, United States Code, is18 amended—

(1) in subsection (b), by striking "with a motivating purpose of engaging in any illicit sexual conduct with another person" and inserting "with intent to engage in any illicit sexual conduct with another person";

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1 (2) by redesignating subsections (d), (e), (f), 2 and (g) as subsections (e), (f), (g), and (i), respec-3 tively; 4 (3) in subsection (e), as so redesignated, by 5 striking "with a motivating purpose of engaging in any illicit sexual conduct" and inserting "with intent 6 7 to engage in any illicit sexual conduct"; and 8 (4) by inserting after subsection (g), as so re-9 designated, the following: 10 "(h) RULE OF CONSTRUCTION.—As used in this sec-11 tion, the term 'intent' shall be construed as any intention 12 to engage in illicit sexual conduct at the time of the travel.". 13 14 SEC. 4. ABUSE UNDER THE GUISE OF CHARITY. 15 Section 2423 of title 18, United States Code, as amended by section 3 of this Act, is amended— 16 17 (1) by inserting after subsection (c) the fol-18 lowing: 19 "(d) ILLICIT SEXUAL CONDUCT IN CONNECTION 20 WITH CERTAIN ORGANIZATIONS.—Any citizen of the 21 United States or alien admitted for permanent residence 22 who----

23 "(1) is an officer, director, employee, or agent
24 of an organization that affects interstate or foreign
25 commerce;

1	"(2) makes use of the mails or any means or
2	instrumentality of interstate or foreign commerce
3	through the connection or affiliation of the person
4	with such organization; and
5	"(3) commits an act in furtherance of illicit sex-
6	ual conduct through the connection or affiliation of
7	the person with such organization,
8	shall be fined under this title, imprisoned for not more
9	than 30 years, or both.";
10	(2) in subsection (f), as so redesignated, by
11	striking "or (d)" and inserting "(d), or (e)"; and
12	(3) in subsection (i), as so redesignated, by
13	striking " $(f)(2)$ " and inserting " $(g)(2)$ ".
14	SEC. 5. SEXUAL ACTIVITY WITH MINORS.
15	Section 2427 of title 18, United States Code, is
16	amended by inserting "does not require interpersonal

17 physical contact, and" before "includes".
